Message from the Chief Manager

The Hong Kong Cultural Centre (HKCC), a prominent cultural landmark located by the Victoria Harbour, has been recognised as the territory's prime world-class performing arts venue since its opening in 1989. In the past two years, the HKCC team has joined forces with its partners of various arts interests to strive to promote local arts and cultural development as well as international exchange, impressing the audience at the HKCC with a dazzling array of performances which exhibited the wonderful creativity of performing arts.

The year 2019 saw the 30th Anniversary of the HKCC's opening. To enliven the HKCC with extra vibrancy, we presented over 40 programmes commemorating the anniversary in seven months featuring top-notch artists from around the world, our four venue partners, namely the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra, the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, the Hong Kong Ballet and Zuni Icosahedron, as well as local arts groups. The sheer creativity and richness of these commemorative programmes not only demonstrated our aspiration for a good diversity of arts, but also ushered in an exciting new chapter in local performing arts. For this I am deeply indebted to the arts practitioners who participated in and behind the scenes.

At the beginning of 2020, quite a number of performances were postponed or cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Despite the temporary venue closure under compulsory social distancing measures in the fight against the pandemic, the HKCC has never ceased to cope with the challenge with innovative thinking. On the one hand, the HKCC has leveraged relevant technologies to assist venue partners in connecting audiences and the performers through live streaming programmes. On the other hand, the HKCC has continued to upgrade its venue facilities through a number of refurbishment or maintenance works projects, such as installing electronic display panels and enhancing barrier-free access facilities. I am extremely thankful to my predecessor Ms Fionn Yeung, who led a unified team to continuously fulfil the HKCC's mission and serve the public with professionalism and perseverance in this challenging time.

I am very glad to join my colleagues and work with all units to continuously enhance this cultural venue and its services. With our team's passion, we will overcome the challenges and tide over the pandemic. Even though the pandemic is not yet over, we will still endeavour to create an ideal environment and make brave attempts in presenting the creativity of performing arts and audience experience with a view to exploring new possibilities for performers and audiences alike, and offering extraordinary arts experience to the people of Hong Kong.



Facilities

Opened in 1989, the Hong Kong Cultural Centre (HKCC) comprises an Auditoria Building, an Administration Building, a Restaurant Block and a Piazza. The three major performance venues in the Auditoria Building, namely the Concert Hall, the Grand Theatre and the Studio Theatre, cater for a wide range of music, dance and theatrical performances of both traditional and modern works.

In addition to the main stages, the HKCC also provides venues for visual arts display, rooms for rehearsal and practice, as well as function rooms for meetings and seminars. Together with a performing arts shop and four catering outlets (one Chinese restaurant, two Western restaurants and one coffee shop), the HKCC offers a diverse range of services for our visitors and patrons.

Located on Tsim Sha Tsui's waterfront and boasting a stunning view of the Victoria Harbour, the HKCC Piazza makes an ideal venue for large-scale outdoor events. It is not only a tourist hotspot, but also a popular place for the locals to hang out and celebrate.



Programme Highlights



Programme commemorating the 30th Anniversary of the Hong Kong Cultural Centre:

Nobody but a Princess... by phase7 performing.arts

The years 2018 - 20 saw a wide spectrum of performances at the HKCC, offering a rich array of arts experiences to suit different tastes. In 2019, the HKCC hosted over 40 commemorative programmes featuring first-rate local and overseas performers in celebration of the 30th Anniversary of its opening.

The 30th Anniversary of the Hong Kong Cultural Centre

To celebrate the 30th Anniversary of its opening, the HKCC hosted a fun day entitled "Let's Fun@HKCC" on 9 November 2019. Various artists and groups offered different programmes at the foyer, piazza areas and Studio Theatre to share with the public the story of how the HKCC, one of the city's remarkable landmarks, had been accompanying and progressing with Hong Kong people over the past three decades. On that day, HKCC's venue partners including the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra (HKCO), the Hong Kong Ballet (HKB), the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra (HKPO) and Zuni Icosahedron (Zuni) presented Western and Chinese music, ballet performances, and a sound and scene recreation of the former Kowloon-Canton Railway Station using the latest technology at the foyer and in the piazza areas. In addition, "Unseen Scene", curated by a local artist, was held in the backstage areas of the HKCC. Through music, dance, projections and other special performances, participants were able to have a closer look at the magic behind a show. Other programmes included a Stage and Technology Workshop, which introduced the possibilities of stage technology in different ways, and the 30th Anniversary exhibition "Traces of the Past and Future". The exhibition was equipped with interactive multimedia, including electronic guest books which re-enacted the

autographs of renowned guests of the HKCC over the past 30 years. The exhibition also displayed valuable artefacts and documents, and showed various interview videos to examine how the HKCC and other performing arts venues of the Leisure and Cultural Services Department (LCSD) worked as a whole complementarily. The event attracted about 30 000 participants.

Apart from the above-mentioned free events, a rich array of more than 40 creative programmes truly reflecting the HKCC's artistic vision of diversity and pluralism was held from June to December 2019. These included performances by such acclaimed orchestras as London Symphony Orchestra, Sir András Schiff and Cappella Andrea Barca, Piano Recital by Evgeny Kissin, and Violin Recital by Anne-Sophie Mutter. Other important highlights included Akram Khan's Giselle by English National Ballet, XENOS by Akram Khan Company, The Great Tamer by Dimitris Papaioannou, Coco Chanel by Jo Strømgren Kompani and Ulrike Quade Company, The Other Mozart created, written and performed by Sylvia Milo, Nuhikun (Directions to Servants) by A Laboratory of Theatre Play BAN'YU-INRYOKU, Spartacus by Korean National Ballet, Puccini's opera Turandot, Verdi's opera Rigoletto, Mozart's opera Don Giovanni, Dance Dome by 4π Productions and Coreo Cymru, and Nobody but a Princess... by phase7 performing.arts. It was indeed a showcase of the vibrant cultures and tastes of countries around the world.

Major Festivals

From March to April every year, a selection of unique movies on distinctive themes from different countries and regions is screened at the Grand Theatre of the HKCC at the annual **Hong Kong International Film Festival**. In the past two years, nearly 12 000 film buffs and over 9 000 enthusiasts attended the 42nd and 43rd International Film Festivals for 24 and 13 screenings respectively.

Held between June and August every year at the HKCC, the **Chinese Opera Festival** is a not-to-be-missed event for local Chinese Opera fans. In 2018, the Festival included *The Palace of Eternal Life* by Shanghai Kunqu Opera Troupe. In 2019, it featured a stunning series of full-length traditional classics, namely *Romance of the West Chamber*, *Meng Lijun*, *Tale of the West Garden* and *Southeast the Peacocks Fly*, performed by a number of artists from the Shanghai Yue Opera Group, who were National Class One Performers and winners of the Plum Blossom Award for Chinese Theatre.

Every summer, the International Arts Carnival features a rich diversity of educational, entertaining and tailor-made performing arts programmes for the whole family. Hansel & Gretel by Scottish Ballet, the opening programme for 2018, was an adaptation of a classic from Grimm's Fairy Tales, in which the mysterious ambience of the original story was faithfully reproduced through exquisite choreography and music, dreamlike sets and lavish costumes.

The 2019 carnival opened with the Asian premiere of *The Heart of Robin Hood* by Vesturport, which took the audience on an adventure through Robin Hood's Sherwood Forest with a mix of elements such as acrobatics, live music and romantic comedy. Other highlights included *Bedtime Stories* by Upswing, *I Wish I Could Make a Wish – The Theatre Concert of Jimmy Liao* by the HKCO, *The Nightingale* by The Only Stage, and *KU-SO-OLYMPICS* by Unlock Dancing Plaza X Namstrops X SunFool.

The biennial **New Vision Arts Festival** aims to achieve four principal objectives, namely crossover collaborations, nurturing new talents, commissioning new works, and overseas outreach, with a view to broadening realisations and concepts of "art". The 2018 Festival opened with *Tree of Codes*, which advanced cross-boundary creativity by drawing together world-class performers including dancer Wayne McGregor, musician Jamie xx and visual artist Olafur Eliasson in a production combining literature, sculpture, architecture and space design with performing arts. The Festival also saw the return of the world-renowned Tan Dun, who brought to the audience his new work *Buddha Passion* in collaboration with the International Choir Academy Lübeck and the

HKPO & Chorus. Sung in Chinese and Sanskrit, this trailblazing Dunhuang epic recounted the Buddha's stories depicted by the murals in Mogao Caves to celebrate universal values such as equality and sacrifice.

The **World Cultures Festival**, dedicated to different cultures from around the globe, brings unique artistic gems from various regions to Hong Kong to shed light on traditional and modern-day human values, and issues of public concern. The 2019 Festival, entitled "The Nordics", showcased the essence of the arts from five Nordic countries: Finland, Norway, Denmark, Sweden and Iceland. The opening programme *Autumn Sonata*, based on a signature film by Swedish master director Ingmar Bergman, was a contemporary opera adapted by renowned Finnish composer Sebastian Fagerlund to tell a tale of an inharmonious relationship. Other highlights included *The Chronic Life* by the pioneer of "Theatre Anthropology" Eugenio Barba and his acclaimed Odin Teatret, and Nordic Café Series: *Kinder K* by Kristofer Grønskag. The Nordic Café Series turned the HKCC's Studio Theatre into an informal "salon", complete with appropriate décor, for the audience to appreciate chamber music, play-reading and improvisational theatre while comfortably enjoying snacks and drinks.

The annual Hong Kong Arts Festival (HKAF) brings together world acclaimed artists and local artistic talents for a sumptuous feast of eminent works. In 2019, the 47th HKAF opened with passionate South American symphonies by Marin Alsop with the São Paulo Symphony Orchestra on their first visit to Hong Kong. The audience was then treated to such absorbing programmes as *Opera Chorus Concert* by Chor der Oper Leipzig, Paavo Järvi with the NHK Symphony Orchestra, Les Siècles:

BERLIOZ 150, Matsuev and Friends Play Jazz, Thomas Quasthoff Quartet, Riyehee Hong Organ Recital, From Baroque to Tango by Li Biao Percussion Group, and P is for PERCUSSION! Family Concert. Other marvellous programmes masterfully rendered included Wagner's Tannhäuser by Oper Leipzig with Gewandhausorchester Leipzig and Chor der Oper Leipzig, Dressed by the Night (Vestida de Nit) by Sílvia Pérez Cruz, Cloud Gate Dance Theatre of Taiwan – The 45th Anniversary Gala Programme: Retrospectives of Lin Hwai-min's Works, and The Tragedy of Hamlet, Prince of Denmark by Beijing LiLiuyi Theatre Studio. At the finale of the Festival, Europe's top ballet company Hamburg Ballet gave dazzling performances of a series of works created by its artistic director John Neumeier, including The World of John Neumeier, The Nutcracker and Beethoven Project, showing the journey into ballet works of the very legend in dance.


All live performances and face-to-face activities scheduled for the 48th HKAF were cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Venue Support

The HKCC supports local culture and arts. Under the Concessionary Rates for Non-profit Organisation Scheme, non-profit making hirers launching arts-related activities are eligible for rental reduction of up to 65% of the basic hire charges. Among the 1107 hirers in 2018-19, 356 enjoyed subsidies amounting to over HK\$6.68 million whereas over HK\$3.36 million was granted to 229 out of 706 hirers in 2019-20.


Striving for Excellence

Venue Partners

The Venue Partnership Scheme

The LCSD launched the Venue Partnership Scheme at the performing arts venues under its management in 2009. The Scheme aims to foster a partnership between performing arts groups and venues with a view to enhancing the artistic image and character of both the venues and their partners, broadening their audience base, making the best use of existing facilities, formulating venue-based marketing strategies, encouraging community involvement in the development of the arts, and fostering the development of performing arts in the community. The four venue partners of the HKCC are the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra, the Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra, the Hong Kong Ballet and Zuni Icosahedron.

Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra (HKPO)

The world-renowned conductor Jaap van Zweden, Music Director of the New York Philharmonic, continues to serve concurrently as the Music Director of the HKPO, with Yu Long, Artistic Director/ Chief Conductor of the China Philharmonic Orchestra, as the Principal Guest Conductor. During the 2018-19 and 2019-20 seasons, internationally renowned conductors including Vladimir Ashkenazy, Edo de Waart, David Atherton, Jun Märkl and Osmo Vänskä were invited to lead the HKPO in concerts. The highly sought-after show *Joe Hisaishi in Concert*, featuring the maestro himself, saw the first-ever introduction of a "ticket ballot and real-name ticketing system" for the sale of the concert tickets. As the year 2019 marked the 30th Anniversary of the opening of the HKPO again invited the legendary soprano Renée Fleming to sing in Hong Kong to commemorate the anniversary, as well as celebrate the naming of the HKPO, the first Asian

orchestra ever, as Orchestra of the Year by the British magazine Gramophone. To commemorate the 250th birthday of Beethoven in 2020, the HKPO launched the Beethoven 250th Series that stretched over two seasons from 2019-20, with pianist Lang Lang playing at the opening concert. Apart from offering traditional orchestral music, the HKPO brought Cirque de la Symphonie and the magic of circus back to the concert

hall. It also presented the Star Wars series, playing iconic music from the movies live during movie screenings. Other series included the Swire Denim Series for new audiences in a light-hearted setting, and the Swire Sunday Family Series for the whole family.

Hong Kong Chinese Orchestra (HKCO)

The HKCO strives to amalgamate tradition with innovation in the realm of Chinese music, and therefore shares the stage with musicians and arts groups of different genres on a regular basis. In Spreading Chinese Music on China Soil and Beyond, the HKCO performed with invited artists Shen Cheng, Professor of China Conservatory of Music cum huqin performer, and Su Chang, lecturer of guzheng at the Central Conservatory of Music. A Historic Dialogue saw pipa master Wu Man rendering the works of internationally acclaimed composer Zhao Jiping. Wang Guotong at 80 – a Birthday Tribute Concert reunited legendary erhu master cum music educator Wang Guotong with his best students from three generations to give a virtuoso performance of huqin classics, exhibiting the HKCO's effort to pass on Chinese music. In Li Biao Conducts The Butterfly Lovers, outstanding solo percussionist Li Biao made a crossover and conducted the HKCO for the violin concerto classic The Butterfly Lovers featuring internationally acclaimed violinist Huang Mengla. In When Janoska Meets HKCO, Janoska Ensemble from Europe was invited to present with the HKCO a fusion concert of dazzling cross-regional and cross-cultural music. The Drums of Hong Kong and Majestic Drums from Hong Kong Drum Festival, a brand event, brought together famous local percussionists and performing groups for a thunderous

performance including lion dance and its drums. Eternal Wings – Hong Kong Cultural Centre 30th Anniversary Concert, featuring organist Shen Yuan and pianist Chen Sa, was a replica of the thrilling programme for the opening of the HKCC 30 years back. The HKCO also put on two crossover productions, namely Peony Pavilion and The Palace of Eternal Life, and I Wish I Could Make a Wish. The former saw the

first-time collaboration between "prince of kunqu opera" Zhang Jun and the HKCO in an effort to create more sophisticated Chinese music with kunqu, while the latter was a music theatre presentation adapted from the picture books of Taiwanese picture book author Jimmy Liao to demonstrate the infinite possibilities of Chinese music on different dimensions.

Hong Kong Ballet (HKB)

During the 2018-19 and 2019-20 seasons, the HKB staged a number of full-length ballets. ALICE (in wonderland) (Asian premiere), choreographed by the HKB's Artistic Director Septime Webre, fascinated its audience with chic costumes, bold sets and stunning visual stage effects. It was the winner of the 21st Hong Kong Dance Awards in 2019 in the following categories: "Outstanding Performance by a Female

Dancer", "Outstanding Ensemble Performance" and "Outstanding Costume Design". Another production, Giselle, hailed as the greatest romantic ballet ever created, treated its audience to the most mysterious experience in the classical ballet repertoire. The 40th Anniversary season of the HKB opened with the Asian premiere of Peter Pan, a fusion of classical ballet and comedy/farce presented with lively choreography. Also staged were Swan Lake, the most romantic and absorbing classic hailed as "the ballet of all ballets", and the all-time ballet classic The Nutcracker for every Christmas. HK Ballet x HK Phil: Rite of Spring, presented in collaboration with the HKPO, was a showcase of groundbreaking contemporary ballet of a unique and innovative style. For two consecutive years, the Annual International Gala of Stars gave the audience a chance to appreciate the breathtaking collaborative performance of the HKB dancers and international ballet stars. Wheeldon, Ratmansky, McIntyre and The Beatles was a fresh and energetic ballet performance featuring three works by the most influential contemporary choreographers. Ballet Classics for Children: Carnival of the Animals, an interactive educational programme for the whole family, gave children their first experience of attending a live performance of ballet.

Zuni Icosahedron (Zuni)

The 2008-19 and 2019-20 seasons of Zuni centred around the themes of "Theatre is Technology" and "Beautiful Space" respectively, with "theatre" and "innovation" as the key elements. The aesthetics of stage space was presented through the interaction of theatrical performance and technology. For example, Z Innovation Lab transformed the Studio Theatre of the HKCC into a laboratory of stage technology by creating an audio-visual space for

Blind Musician Dou Wun and Rotten Big Ass to reproduce the life of the legendary local expert in Deishui Naamyam, a song-art. Z/Z Twin Lab, jointly established by Zuni and the Zurich University of the Arts, gave the first telematic performance in the two cities in sync, breaking down the boundaries of time and geographical zones. The Interrupted Dream: Event at the Museum and Monkey Business: Event at the Zoo explored the experimental collision between traditional and contemporary art. Comic theatre works The Pork Chop Inferno and The Pork Chop Inferno - Chamber of Experience used the unique space of theatre to create a threedimensional watching experience out of two-dimensional comics. The Self and the Other Series and We Are Now Six, both being dance theatre works, experimented with crossover theatre. In In Search of New China, four multimedia video artists who had collaborated with Danny Yung reconstructed the classics in his forty-year experiment with China. God or No God, a music theatre work, was an artistic creation combining music, philosophy and multimedia images. First Lessons in Heart Sutra was a multimedia music theatre work that used a combination of the Heart Sutra and Bach's music together with interactive video images to invite the audience to different realms of visual and auditory perception. The Architecture of the City and In Praise of Shadow, both from the "Architecture Music Theatre" series, explored the definition of "beautiful space" in the theatrical context.

Building Awareness



The HKCC has been actively organising various free and educational activities to cultivate public interests and encourage participation in performing arts. These activities include the monthly foyer programmes "Weekday Happy Hours" and "Weekend Arts Delights", as well as special Sunday music programmes staged at the Piazza. In reaching out for a wider audience, performing arts from both the Chinese and Western worlds are presented to cater for different artistic tastes.

The Rieger organ in the Hong Kong Cultural Centre Concert Hall is a spectacular instrument with four manuals, 93 stops and 8 000 pipes. Its versatility, as demonstrated by the wide range of sounds and rich variety of tonal colours, has made it capable of playing from a vast repertoire. To promote organ music, overseas and local organists are invited to perform in free organ recitals scheduled on Saturday afternoons in the Concert Hall on a regular basis. Moreover, organ

education programmes are arranged to provide systematic training, in addition to workshops or master classes hosted by overseas organist-educators, to enhance students' skills in performance and appreciation.


The HKCC also teams up with local arts groups and practitioners to give guided pipe organ concerts and demonstration performances, cultivating interests of students and the general public in pipe organ music.


